Ensemble Txistu in victory the Competition for Txistulari Bands held in Errenteria. leadership extended to the Bilbao Municipal Txistu Ensemble since 2004. Garikoitz's musical journey illustrious. featuring collaborations with prestigious orchestras including the Basque National Orchestra,



Bilbao Symphony Orchestra, Navarre Symphony Orchestra, and more, in renowned venues like the Euskalduna in Bilbao, the National Auditorium in Madrid, and the Liceo in Barcelona. He has an extensive discography encompassing various genres, from classical and traditional music to Celtic and jazz, collaborating with esteemed artists such as Carlos Nuñez, Kepa Junkera, and others. One of his remarkable achievements is the groundbreaking "TXISTU SYMPHONIC," where he played alongside the Basque Symphonyc orchestra. In 2022, he recorded "GUTIZIA," a double

CD as a soloist with the Basque Symphonic

Orchestra. Currently, he is a member of the Basque parliament and also an esteemed member of the Royal Basque Society of Friends of the Country.



The recital will feature Garikoitz Mendizabal, an exceptionally skilled txistu player from the Basque Country. Through selection of carefully curated pieces, you will experience the essence of Basque music, with its distinctive themes, rhythms, tones, and melodies.

The txistu, esteemed as one of the most ancient musical instruments known to humanity, offers a captivating window into the depths of musical history.



Its origins can be traced to Prehistory, with the earliest known txistu having been discovered in the Izturitz Cave. Remarkably, this instrument was fashioned from the ulna bone of a vulture. Dating back to the Aurignacian period of the Upper Paleolithic era, approximately 38,000 to 28,000 years ago, the txistu's antiquity is awe-inspiring. This instrument, designed with three holes, possesses a unique feature—it can be played with a single hand, leaving the other free for percussion accompaniment.
